



INTERNATIONAL REPORT RELEASED Annual Report Calls Sex Education "A Right"

The International Planned Parenthood Federation's Western Hemisphere Region (IPPF-WHR) has released *Annual Report 2010*. The report is a tool used to convince the world of the "need" for Planned Parenthood programs—and even to rationalize its very existence.

The first section of *Annual Report 2010* is called "Sexual Rights." As with virtually all Planned Parenthood reports, the focus is on the "stories" of women who "needed" its "services." The first article in this section is titled, "Advancing the Right to Comprehensive Sexuality Education in Peru." It begins with the story of a 19-year-old who got pregnant two years earlier. According to the article, when "Adrianna" learned of the pregnancy she "didn't understand" what had happened. Really?



It is important that Adrianna's living conditions be dramatized for maximum impact on the reader. The report states that she resides in a "squatter settlement" with her 11-month-old, her parents, an uncle and two cousins. This is followed by the usual plea for IPPF-WHR to step in and fill the "needs" of Peruvian women. According to the report, Adrianna "knew

what a condom was, but not how to use it." She is quoted as saying exactly what IPPF-WHR officials want to hear. "I would have liked the school to teach girls about sexuality, how to protect ourselves and avoid infections, so we aren't surprised later," she supposedly said. The report notes that Adrianna had made "a good point."

Annual Report 2010 is titled, "Sexuality Education: It's a Right." The article on Peru includes a reference to another important IPPF-WHR document:

As Article 8 of *Sexual rights: an IPPF declaration* states, "all persons, without discrimination, have the right to...comprehensive sexuality education and information necessary to exercise full citizenship and equality in the private, public and political domains." However, many people are denied this basic human right.

This is followed by the painting of a scenario that shows the "need" for IPPF-WHR to step in:

High rates of adolescent pregnancy are common throughout the region, particularly among the most economically vulnerable. Sexually transmitted infections and early pregnancies send

young people on a downward spiral of poverty and further social exclusion.

In Peru the need for high quality school-based comprehensive sexuality education is critical starting in primary school. Twenty-three percent of Peruvian adolescent girls have had their first sexual experience by the age of 15. Adolescent fertility rates are almost ten times higher for the poorest twenty percent of the population than they are for the richest twenty percent in Peru. Alarmingly, only 34 percent of Peruvian women aged 15-24 know that consistent condom use prevents HIV transmission.

Several of these points must be addressed:

- "*Sexually transmitted infections [STIs] and early pregnancies send young people on a downward spiral of poverty and further social exclusion.*"

This statement is presented as fact; not a *possibility*. It is also void of comment regarding the Planned Parenthood "solution" to the supposed problem (birth control, abortion, forced sexuality policy indoctrination) compared to the humane responses (economic development, care, education etc.) offered by others. Just how far—how radical—would IPPF-WHR be willing to go when its "usual" practices were to fail?

- "*23% of Peruvian adolescent girls have had their first sexual experience by the age of 15.*"

A definition for the phrase "sexual experience" is not provided. Does it include kissing? Holding hands? All conduct that does not include vaginal intercourse? The broader the definition used by IPPF-WHR the bigger the problem (the "need" for its programs) appears.

- "*Adolescent fertility rates are almost 10 times higher for the poorest 20% percent of the population than they are for the richest 20% in Peru.*" (The pro-abortion United Nations Population Fund [UNFPA] is listed as the source of this "fact.")

The phrase "fertility rate" is defined as "the number of children that would be born to a woman if she were to live to the end of her childbearing years and bear children in accordance with current age-specific fertility rates" or "the ratio of live births in an area to the population of that area." How is that for confusing? You may just look at it as the average number of births per woman over her lifetime. It is important to keep in mind that the fertility rate does not take into account the number

of abortions a woman gets in her lifetime. The fertility rate tracks live children; not dead children.

What the report does not say is that the fertility rate of all Peruvian women has been decreasing for many years. In fact, in 2009 it was just 2.5. Compare this number to the fertility rate of 2.1 in the United States that same year, 1.6 in Europe (was just 1.47 in 2003), and 2.33 worldwide. The basic replacement rate is 2.1. Even if the “adolescent fertility rate” for Peru’s poor was ten times that of the more affluent, the more zealous population control activists would still feel encouraged.

It should be noted that the number of people living in poverty has also been steadily decreasing. In 2005 nearly 48.7 percent were poor. In 2006 the figure was 44.5 percent. In 2007 some 39.3 percent lived in poverty. One year later the rate had been reduced to 36.2 percent. In 2009, the most recent year for available statistics, 34.8 percent were poor.

- “Alarmingly, only 34% of Peruvian women aged 15-24 know that consistent condom use prevents HIV transmission.” (UNFPA was the source of this “fact.”)

Okay, maybe somebody should just tell them? This could be done without the involvement of IPPF-WHR. But there are several problems, the most glaring of which concerns how information is given to women. They should be told that “consistent condom use *may* help prevent HIV transmission.” Women should also be told of the true failure rate of condoms and the moral implications of condom use.

In a story about another Peruvian woman, IPPF-WHR says that 22-year-old Soledad Solis Balboa also resides in a “squatter settlement.” And, true to form, her living conditions are described. “Her home is a small, tidy single room with a dirt floor and tin roof,” the report states. “There are two beds—one for the children and the other for her and her husband.” Now comes the “need” for IPPF-WHR’s meddling. “I am going to advise my daughter to make sure she knows how to protect herself,” Balboa supposedly said. “I will talk to her about contraception.” The pitch continues:

When Soledad was 16 years old, she learned she was pregnant. She wasn’t alone: In 2005, 13 out of every 100 Peruvian adolescents were either pregnant or already a mother. “The teachers told us we should protect ourselves, but they didn’t tell us or show us how,” Soledad says. Sometimes condoms would be handed out but “we didn’t know what to do with them so we threw them away.” Many of her friends in the same predicament dropped out of school and never went back.

“Soledad’s story reminds us that comprehensive sexuality education (CSE) has a critical role to play in *family planning, reducing poverty and empowering women to de-*

mand their human rights (emphasis added).” the report states. “CSE changes lifestyles, communities and future generations.” We are later told that Soledad is not actually just some average Peruvian young person. She is a Planned Parenthood youth educator. No wonder she said exactly what IPPF-WHR wants to hear.



Getting To Know...

Alan Frank Guttmacher was born to Adolf and Laura (Oppenheimer) Guttmacher in Baltimore, Md., on May 19, 1898. He had one sibling, Manfred.

Alan F. Guttmacher married Leonore Gidding on July 22, 1925. They had three children (Ann, Sally, and Susan). Primarily educated at Johns Hopkins University, Guttmacher also had ties to Dartmouth College, Brandeis University, the University of Rochester, and Mt. Sinai Medical School. He was an obstetrician/gynecologist.

Guttmacher became president of the Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA) in 1962, succeeding founder and fellow eugenics advocate Margaret Higgins Sanger. He served as president until his death in 1974. Guttmacher was also vice president of the American Eugenics Society, on the board of directors of the Margaret Sanger Research Bureau, and a member of the Association for Voluntary Sterilization. In 1964 he began four years of service as chairman of the Medical Committee of the International Planned Parenthood Federation.

Guttmacher founded the American Association of Planned Parenthood Physicians to serve as a forum for medical practitioners and scientists to discuss the birth control pill and related topics. He also founded the Association for the Study of Abortion in 1964.

Guttmacher authored several books: *Life in the Making* (1933), *Into This Universe* (1937), *Pregnancy and Birth* (1957), *Babies by Choice or Chance* (1959), *Complications of Pregnancy* (rev. 1965), *Complete Book of Birth Control* (1961), *Planning Your Family* (1964), *Birth Control and Love* (1969), and *Understanding Sex* (1970).

In 2008 Guttmacher’s nephew, Alan E. Guttmacher, M.D., was named acting director of the National Human Genome Research Institute. He helped oversee the advancement of human genome research.

The Guttmacher Institute, which claims to be independent of Planned Parenthood but was originally referred to by PPFA as it “research arm,” is named after Alan F. Guttmacher.

The report covers what is called “the cycle of sex education,” which has five parts:

You and your friends have no access to essential sexual and reproductive health services, information or education. You don’t know how pregnancy happens or anything about condoms.

An educator from the IPPF/WHR local affiliate visits your community to provide sex education, information on contraceptives and HIV prevention. The educator empowers you to make informed choices related to your sexual and reproductive health.

You begin to host informal educational talks in your community. You provide contraceptives to other young people, teach proper condom use and refer community members to IPPF/WHR’s local clinic.

You and your community notice a decrease in adolescents’ rates of unintended pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections like HIV. Young people stay in school and earn an education to become teachers or doctors.

A nearby community learns how sex education transformed your community. They mobilize to make health information and services available in their community. The cycle starts again.

The second section of *Annual Report 2010* addresses “Universal Access.” (Predictably, the *only* source listed for the “facts” used in this section is the Guttmacher Institute, which was named in honor of PPFA’s former leader, Alan F. Guttmacher [see “Getting To Know...” on page 2].) In the accompanying article, “Support for Young Women Facing an Unintended Pregnancy,” personal stories are used to promote the IPPF-WHR agenda. But the goals are made clear before turning to the stories:

In several countries throughout the world, poverty, stigma and legal restrictions severely limit young people’s access to sexual and reproductive health services, such as contraception, testing for sexually transmitted diseases and counseling on options when facing an unintended pregnancy. The need couldn’t be greater. Some 2.5 million adolescents have unsafe abortions every year worldwide. In Latin America, recent figures estimate that 48 percent of sexually active young women have an unmet need for contraception.

IPPF believes that all young women have the right to sexual and reproductive health services provided in a safe and confidential environment. Universal access refers to an array of services, including comprehensive sexuality education, contraception, maternal care, emergency obstetric care, counseling and testing for HIV and other STIs, care and support to victims of sexual violence and safe abortion services. Youth-friendly services help empower and inform young people to take control of their sexual health and prevent unsafe abortion and unintended pregnancy.

This section also includes the story of how IPPF-WHR “rescued” the people of Haiti after the devastating January 2010 earthquake. According to the report, the earthquake created an immediate need for “basic sexual and reproductive health services.” In reality, the people needed housing, life-saving and life-sustaining emergency healthcare, food, and other *true* basics. Still, the natural disaster provided an excuse for IPPF-WHR interference.

The financial section of the report gives the usual data (see boxed sections) as well as a list of supporters. In

2009 IPPF-WHR took in almost \$30.2 million. In 2010 the amount dropped a staggering \$7.4 million to just under \$22.8 million. However, expenses over the two year period were similar. In 2009 IPPF-WHR spent some \$24.7 million. In 2010 it paid out nearly \$25.3 million. (In “IPPF-WHR Expenses At A Glance [2009-2010],” note the difference between the amount of money spent on HIV/AIDS/STIs and Abortion-related activities.)

Good news comes in Assets versus Liabilities. In 2010 the group’s net assets totaled just over \$63.1 million compared to nearly \$67.9 million in 2009. Bad news is that those figures are still rather high. Despite the significant loss of revenue in 2010, IPPF-WHR remains in strong financial health.

Several corporations are listed in the annual report in acknowledgment of their donations to IPPF-WHR in 2010, including Adobe Systems, Johnson & Johnson, JP Morgan Chase, Microsoft, and Wells Fargo.

THE FALLEN

The Pro-Life Movement lost two highly respected and much loved men in June 2011. Rev. *Richard M. Hogan*

was an expert on the Theology of the Body. *James F. Landi* was executive assistant to Mercedes Arzú Wilson, president of the Family of the Americas Foundation. Both men were active in the teaching and promotion of Natural Family Planning.

Rev. *Richard M. Hogan* (July 31, 1951 - June 14, 2011) – The oldest of six children, Hogan attended Catholic schools throughout his early years. In 1973 he graduated summa cum laude from the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minn., with a Bachelor of Arts degree (major: history; minor: foreign language) The next year was spent studying at the University of Munich.



Returning to the Twin Cities after his overseas studies, Hogan earned a Masters (1975) and Doctorate (1978) in medieval history at the University of Minnesota. While working on his doctoral degree, Hogan was accepted as a candidate for the priesthood and began his studies at the St. Paul Seminary in 1977. He was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis in 1981.

Hogan authored several books on the theology of Pope John Paul II, the first two of which were coauthored with the Most Rev. John M. LeVoir, Bishop of New Ulm, Minn. *Covenant of Love* was published in 1985; *Faith For Today* in 1988.

Hogan cofounded a nonprofit company called Image of God, which publishes a Catholic religion textbook series for schools and religious education programs. Called the Image of God Series, the works are based on the teachings of Pope John Paul II. Hogan also served as an editor on the series.

Hogan had been a pastor and served several parishes in the Twin Cities. He was as a regular guest on EWTN and had a television series called “Theology of the Body.”

“Fr. Hogan was a wonderful, kind and truly caring man who worked every day for God and all mankind,” said LDI President Douglas R. Scott, Jr. “He was both a brilliant scholar and a down-to-earth man of the people. We already miss him.”



James Francis Landi (July 30, 1964 - June 9, 2011) – “We are simply devastated,” said LDI President Douglas R. Scott, Jr., upon learning of the death of pro-life activist Jim Landi. A resident of Hyattsville, Md., Landi worked at the Family of the Americas Foundation for nearly 22 years. He died following a sudden brain hemorrhage.

“Jim was at work here in the morning and there was no sign something was wrong,” Wilson said. “He left in the

afternoon to go to a second job where he collapsed.” Due to the critical nature of his condition, Landi was transferred to a hospital in Washington, D.C. Doctors said they may have been able to help if he had been treated within the first 24 hours, but they were under orders from the family to do nothing. Vehemently against allowing treatment, Landi’s sister-in-law said, “I don’t want to have to take care of him for the next 40 years.”

Ironically, in recent months Wilson and Landi had been urging the Vatican to adopt a strong pro-life position in such cases (see “‘Brain Death’ and the Catholic Church: Catholic Pro-Life Leader Is A Voice ‘Crying In The Wilderness’,” *Special Reports*, Summer 2010). Wilson, who was at the hospital with Landi’s relatives throughout the ordeal, passionately urged them to consent to care. She pointed to a card in his wallet that expressed these wishes. Landi’s sister-in-law told Wilson she had no right to give an opinion because she was not part of the family, despite the fact that he was much closer to Wilson than any member of his family—especially his sister-in-law. Landi’s wishes and Wilson’s pleas were summarily ignored. Treatment was denied and he passed away—some 48 hours after collapsing. He was 46 years old.

After Wilson returned home the night of Landi’s death she began to tell an employee who is originally from Guatemala what had happened. When Wilson reached the part with the “I don’t want to have to take care of him for the next 40 years” comment the employee interrupted. “We’ll take care of him!” the young woman eagerly volunteered. She did not even hesitate, which is a testament to a culture that embraces those in need. Wilson then told her employee that her kind offer would not be necessary.

Wilson described Landi as “a much loved servant of God; a kind soul and wonderful, caring man.” Scott concurred. “There are few people in this world who make me stop and say to myself, ‘I wish I were more like him,’ but Jim’s wit, compassion, humility, joy and servant’s heart easily put him in that select group. People who never had the chance to meet Jim really missed out on a great experience.”

Scott said there was never a time he spent with Jim that failed to bring a lot of laughter. “I will never forget the time I spent with Jim in China (see “Pro-Life Groups Speak to Chinese,” *The Caleb Report*, November-December 2007). As soon as we got off the plane, Jim said, ‘Let’s ask the taxi driver to take us to America-town.’”

“Goodbye, Jim,” Scott said. “Our hearts are broken but we praise God for giving us the honor of knowing such a

truly amazing man.” Scott asked people to pray for Wilson. “Jim and I were good friends, but he was like a son to Mercedes. They saw each other almost every day and loved and respected each other very much.”

FALLOUT

 As expected, there has been a lot of reaction to the votes in the U.S. House of Representatives that would have barred Planned Parenthood from getting federal funds (see “Planned Parenthood And Title X: Billion Dollar Group Will Lose Federal Funds If Republicans Hold Firm,” *The Caleb Report*, January-February 2011). It was bad enough when the House passed H.R. 217, which would have made the pro-abortion group ineligible for Title X funds. (It currently gets an estimated \$53 million per year from Title X alone.) But when the House passed H.R. 1, which would have prevented the abortion-committing entity from getting any federal funds, it seemed that virtually every pro-abortion activist had something to say.

In mid-March 2011, PPFA sent a fund-raising message to supporters pleading for help in raising public awareness of the “attack” on its funding. Signed by PPFA President Cecile Richards, the subject of the message was, “STICK with Planned Parenthood.” The message itself was titled, “I Stand With Planned Parenthood”:

You’re absolutely amazing. You’re standing with Planned Parenthood. You’re e-mailing and calling your elected representatives. You’re telling your friends, changing your profile picture, sharing articles, and pretty much doing whatever it takes to make sure basic health care, family planning, HIV testing, cancer screening, and more are all there for generations to come.

Patricia Pitkus Bainbridge has closely monitored PPFA communications. After reading the message (above), she the cofounder of LDI noted that the PPFA’s leaders “are sounding more desperate each day.”

PPFA apologists are doing their part. Just as donations to the pro-abortion group in the name of Sarah Palin have been encouraged, one pro-abortion activist has used the same tactic to raise money, but this time it is in the name of the Speaker of the House. “Donate to Planned Parenthood...Boehner’s name!” reads the heading of the fund-raising pitch. A statement of explanation accompanies the heading. You will note that, in a useless attempt to dissuade Boehner, he will be informed of the donation:

On Friday, February 18th the U.S. House of Representatives voted to pass a Republican-backed amendment to H.R. 1 that will strip Planned Parenthood from all federal funding.

These funds pay for services such as cancer screenings, breast exams, STD testing and birth control. They are never used to pay for abortion.

Help fund Planned Parenthood AND send a strong message that this attack on women's health is unacceptable—donate \$5 to Planned Parenthood in Speaker of the House John Boehner's name.

...

You can donate as little as \$5, or as much as you want! For every person who does this, John Boehner will get a card saying a gift has been made to Planned Parenthood in his name.

One shocking online commentaries backing taxpayer funding of Planned Parenthood was written by “Jay”—a young man who was quite honest when expressing the rationale for his position. The piece was written as a letter to Congress (errors are too numerous to note):

Note: While profanity has been omitted, the following quoted text still includes some offensive material. Please use discretion.

Rumor has it that like, some people of congress have decided to deny funding to Planned Parenthood. Here's the deal, ok: I really need Planned Parenthood. I won't go into details right now, but let me just say, your honors of Congress, that I need Planned Parenthood and some of the services they offer. Get it?

Planned Parenthood is a wonderful organization that helps people plan parenthood. When parenthood is not planned, it's really not cool. Parenthood is really expensive. Children are expensive. They're the kind of thing you must plan for. Unless, of course, you decide to terminate those plans, early on because you're not finished with college and you still have a lot more chicks to skeez on. That's where Planned Parenthood comes in. And if they don't receive money from the government, then their services are going to be way more expensive.

I know, I probably could be more a more cautious person, and I probably wouldn't need Planned Parenthood as often as I do, but I'll just go ahead and say it: I get tons of [expletive]. When you get a lot of [expletive], like I do, you don't always have time to prepare. Meaning, I don't always have protection on me. But it's like. When a chick wants it, she wants it. And who am I to deny her that?

And then, too. Let's not forget that chicks have rights. Like it's their body and their choice, and the choice shouldn't cost so much that I'm forced to sell my Xbox 360 and all my games to help a chick make that choice. Planned Parenthood also gives out condoms and birth control pills.
